

Ontario at a Crossroads


Home Care for the Future

- The shift from hospital to home must be intentional, data-driven, and equitable.




Why We're Here

- Hospitals can no longer be the front door of care.
- Home care is primary care for many Ontarians.
- In rural regions, home care is often the only line of care.
- We must design for trust, technology, and connection — not just transactions.



The Ontario Reality


- 1M Ontarians receive home care each year.
- 40% of LTC admissions could be avoided with stronger home supports.
- 525K+ Ontarians without a family doctor rely on home care as their primary link.
- 600+ temporary rural ED closures in 2022-23 highlight home care's role in maintaining access.

Home care is the connective tissue linking every community








Why Home-Based Design Matters

- Home ≠ Hospital Lite it's where prevention, trust, and recovery intersect.
- Designing for context means designing for geography — models must work for Toronto and Tobermory alike.
- Relationship-based and data-driven innovation.
- Systems must fit people's lives, not the other way around.



Lived Experience as Evidence

- Lived experience is data.
- Clients and caregivers reveal what works in real life.
- Shift from consultation → co-design
 → co-delivery.



Innovation in Action: Scaling Home Care with Own Health

Founded in 2020 by Dr. Asem Saleh, vascular surgeon at Humber River Health, Own Health provides a specialist-led, NP-delivered model shifting care from hospitals to communities for complex and unattached patients across Ontario and PEI.






Innovation in Action:
